COURSE CATALOG DESCRIPTION

Documentary Project/Episodes OR Short Film

Project: You will apply what you've learned to create a documentary

project/episodes or Short Film Project. You will have one project or 2 episodes this semester. You will not receive a grade without completing

these. Your project/episodes are worth 50% of your final grade.

An absence is excused when a student is absent from class due to participating in programs, activities, etc. that are sponsored by the University and verified by the sponsor, or when a student is confronted with an extenuating circumstance, such as death in the immediate family, a judicial case, or serious illness, etc. These absences will be excuse only when the student presents official documentation of the situation to the teacher. All other absences are unexcused.
- 3. When a student misses classes in excess of the number outlined in No. 2 whether due to negligence or some other reason, the instructor will warn him/her that additional absences may result in failure to pass the course.

CLASS POLICIES:

- I. Students are required to attend class regularly.
- II. Films and Lectures will not be replayed or given again. Missing class will put you at a serious disadvantage.
- III. If you have to miss a shoot let your instructor and your groups know in advance. If you are going to be late, notify your instructor and group as soon as possible.
- IV. This class will require you to spend 2 or 3 evenings of filming.
- V. You will have 10 days after your shoot date to edit your documentary episode and submit it.
- VI. If you miss class, it is <u>your</u> responsibility to check with me to find out what you missed.
- VII. No eating, drinking or chewing (gum, toothpicks, straws, etc) in the classroom.
- VIII. All cell phones should be turned off during class. If you are texting, excessively using your phone, or it rings during class, then it will be taken and returned to you at the end of the class period.
 - IX. No listening to music devices during class

- X. If you have a problem that you know of in advance that will cause you to miss a deadline telling me in advance could help you get an extension or extra help. By not informing me, you will receive whatever penalty is warranted without exception.
- XI. Any student kicked out of class cannot return without permission from the Dean of Student Affairs and a meeting with the instructor. Being kicked out of class is not an excused absence.
